- **APPLICATION:** These rules and regulations are applicable to all sections G-M unless otherwise stated in that section.
- **CHIEF STEWARD:** Mrs. Sue Stevens
- **SHOW DATE:** 28th February 2026
- **ENTRIES OPEN:** Entries accepted after 9am 1st February 2026.
- **ENTRIES CLOSE:** Entries will not be accepted after 9am Friday 27th February 2026.
- **ENTRIES:** All entries in Homecraft Pavilion Sections to be submitted to Mrs. Sue Stevens by post, phone, or email. Post: 635 Coradjil Road, SIMPSON 3266, Phone: 0427 352 588, Email: sfstevens@bigpond.com
- **ENTRY FEES:** Entry fee \$1 per entry in all sections unless otherwise stated.
- **FEES PAYMENT:** Fees must accompany entries. Fees accepted in cash, cheque or electronic. Bank Account Name: Heytesbury Agricultural Society **BSB 633-000 Account 223943044** Please use your name as a reference.
- **LATE ENTRIES:** Entries fee \$2 per entry for entries received after 7pm 26th February 2026.
- **OWN WORK:** Entries must be the bona fide work of the entrant. Any entry found to be misrepresented or not the original work of the entrant may be disqualified. All exhibitors must be amateur, and exhibits must have been completed within the last 12 months.
- **REFUNDS:** Entry fees will not be refunded under any circumstance.
- **PRIZES:** Prizes unless otherwise stated, First: \$2, Second: \$1, Third: Honorable mention.
- **HIGHEST AGGREGATE:** Prizes: Rosette. Will only be awarded where more than 3 individual entrants are entered into the class.
- **BEST EXHIBIT/ HIGHEST AGGREGATE** prizes will be \$20 unless a physical prize is donated and will be distributed by the Chief Steward and Stewards on the day.
- **EXHIBITS:** An exhibit cannot be entered into more than one class. Exhibits must be non-offensive and appropriate for display for minors. The steward reserves the right to not display any exhibit they deem to be offensive. Exhibits in all sections must be left in the pavilion between 8:00am and 10:00am on Friday 27th February 2026. From 10:00am all exhibitors must leave the pavilion.
- **ENTRY TICKETS** must be firmly attached to all exhibits.
- **JUDGING:** Judging commences at 10.30am on Friday 27th February 2026. In all pavilion sections the Judge's decision is FINAL. Judges may award a second prize instead of a first where there is only one entry or may withhold a prize altogether where exhibits are considered unworthy. The steward reserves the right to put wrongly entered articles into correct classes.
- **NO ADMITTANCE** will be allowed in the pavilion while judging is in progress.
- **PROPERTY & BEHAVIOUR:** Exhibits MUST be displayed on show benches until the pavilion closes at 3pm. Heytesbury Agricultural Society (HAS) will not under any circumstances be responsible for any loss or damage of exhibits or displays. All exhibits are displayed at the exhibitors' own risk. No exhibitor shall interfere with the exhibits in any way whatsoever during the time the pavilion is open. Anyone interfering without the permission of the steward may be expelled from the showground. If, in the opinion of the Steward, the conduct of any exhibitor shall be such that as to demand such a course, they will have the power to forfeit any or all prizes such exhibitors have won.
- **COLLECTION OF EXHIBITS:** Exhibits are available for collection between 3:30 and 4:30pm. There will be no entry to the pavilion between 3:00pm and 3:30pm unless instructed by the Chief Steward. After this time exhibitors must take charge of their exhibits.
- **NON-COLLECTION OF EXHIBITS:** Any exhibit not collected by Sunday 9th March 2025 shall become the property of the society and be disposed of at their discretion.

- The Rich Fruit Cake competition follows the three levels of competition: Show Level, Group Level and State Level.
- An exhibitor having won at their local Show will bake another cake for the 2026 Group Final and then the winner of the Group Final will bake another cake for the State Final at the 2026 Melbourne Royal Show.
- An exhibitor having won at Show Level is not eligible to enter the VAS Rich Fruit Cake Competition at any other show until after the Group Final judging.
- An exhibitor is only eligible to represent one Group in the State Final.
- If for any reason a winner is unable to compete at Group or State Final Level, then the second placegetter is eligible to compete.
- If an exhibitor is found to have won more than one Group Final the exhibitor must forfeit/refund all prizes and will be disqualified from exhibiting for 12 months.
- The State Final prizes are: **First:** \$300.00 Spotlight Voucher & VAS State Final Trophy, **Second:** \$150.00 Spotlight Voucher, **Third:** \$50.00 Spotlight Voucher
- The following recipe is REQUIRED for all entrants:

Recipe**Ingredients – Preferred 100% Australian Grown Produce**

• 1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg	• 250g sultanas
• 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger	• 250g chopped raisins
• 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves	• 250g currants
• 250g butter	• 125g chopped mixed peel
• 250g soft brown sugar	• 90g chopped red glace cherries
• 1/2 teaspoon lemon essence OR finely grated lemon rind	• 90g chopped blanched almonds
• 1/2 teaspoon almond essence	• 1/3 cup sherry or brandy
• 1/2 teaspoon vanilla essence	• 250g plain flour
• 4 large eggs	• 60g self-raising flour

Method

Cut the fruit & almonds into 3-4 pieces and mix together all the fruits and nuts and sprinkle with the sherry or brandy. Cover and leave for at least 1 hour, but preferably overnight.

Sift together the flours and spices. Cream together the butter and sugar with the essences. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition, and then alternately add the fruit and flour mixtures. Mix thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon.

Place the mixture into a prepared tin 20 cm square, straight sided, square cornered tin and bake in a slow oven for approximately 3½ - 4 hours. Allow the cake to cool in the tin.

- An exhibitor having won at Show Level is not eligible to enter the VAS Carrot Cake Competition at any other show until after the Group Final judging.

- If for any reason a winner is unable to compete at Group or State Final Level, then the second placegetter is eligible to compete.

Recipe**Ingredients**

• 375g plain flour	• 345g castor sugar
• 2tsp baking powder	• 350ml vegetable oil
• 1 ½ tsp bicarb soda	• 4 eggs
• 2tsp ground cinnamon	• 3 medium carrots, grated (350 grams)
• ½ tsp ground nutmeg	• 220g tin crushed pineapple, drained
• ½ tsp allspice	• 180g pecan nuts coarsely crushed
• Pinch of salt	

Method

1. Preheat the oven to 180C (160C fan), Grease a 23cm (9 inch) round cake tin and line with baking paper.
2. Sift the dry ingredients together into a bowl. In a separate bowl, beat the eggs and oil, then add to the dry ingredients. Mix well then add the carrots, crushed pineapple and pecans. Mix to form a smooth batter and pour into the cake tin.
3. Bake for approximately 90 - 100 minutes.
4. Remove from the oven and allow to cool for 10 minutes in the tin on a wire rack. Upend and allow to cool on the wire rack.


